

The Bishop of Chelmsford's Lent Appeal 2025: Supporting Housing Justice

This year the Bishop of Chelmsford's Lent Appeal is raising funds to support the work of Housing Justice, a Christian charity working across England and Wales to alleviate homelessness in all its forms.

Anyone who wishes to make a donation to the appeal can do so by going to the Diocesan website https://www.chelmsford.anglican.org/ and follow the links to the Lent Appeal page

Housing Justice is a Christian charity that works in partnership with churches, community and faith groups across England and Wales to help provide those experiencing homelessness with a safe and stable home.

The work of Housing Justice is channelled through four main projects that aim to tackle homelessness in various ways at a grassroots level. These projects are:

Citadel

Citadel is a volunteer-led homelessness prevention project run by Housing Justice which supports people experiencing, or at risk of homelessness, to find and/or sustain their tenancies and establish a home. Working with trained volunteers, they identify each individual's specific needs and address them together. This could include connecting them with their local community, helping them to seek meaningful employment, accessing a sport or a new hobby, or helping individuals to access the health or financial services they need.

This project began in Wales in 2020 and was expanded in 2024 to include five areas in England including London.

Refugee Hosting and Lodgings Programmes

Housing Justice work with a pool of volunteer hosts in London and Wales who welcome vulnerable individuals into their homes. These individuals include people arriving in the UK seeking sanctuary from war or persecution, those whose asylum claims have been rejected, and those with a complicated immigration status. These individuals do not have the right to work or access benefits and they are found a safe, welcoming home.

Through this project over 37,000 nights of hosting have been provided to vulnerable and destitute asylum seekers and more than 70 guests placed since 2017 resulting in people successfully moving on to permanent accommodation.

Housing Justice also runs a Lodgings Programme for newly-granted refugees while they find a job and more permanent accommodation. This programme was established in response to the rise in newly recognised refugees being forced into homelessness and

rough sleeping following an eviction from Home Office Accommodation.

Faith in Affordable Housing

Housing Justice works with churches of all denominations to release surplus land and redundant buildings for the creation of new truly affordable housing.

The Winter Night Shelter Network

With an estimated 3,898 people sleeping rough each night in England and homelessness and rough sleeping on the rise, the work of faith and community projects like those run by Housing Justice are vital. Without this work, it's estimated the rough sleeper count would be 22% higher.

Speaking about this year's Bishop's Lent Appeal, The Right Reverend Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, The Bishop of Chelmsford said:

"The funds raised through the 2025 Bishop's Lent Appeal will help support the Christian charity Housing Justice and their work providing a community-driven and innovative response to homelessness and those in housing need. Their approach gives individuals the opportunity not only to find suitable accommodation, but to create a home and a sense of belonging. I'm pleased that through this year's Lent Appeal, we will contribute to the variety of projects run by Housing Justice, some of which are happening in areas of our Diocese."

Applications invited for new expanded £5 million conservation fund for churches

Applications for grants to fund the conservation of special church objects such as stained glass, paintings, bells, organs and clocks in churches have been opened. They are part of an expanded £5 million scheme administered by the C of E.

Parishes are invited to apply for such grants towards the conservation of their historical and cultural heritage. The C of E's conservation grants scheme is supported by a £4.68million grant from The National Lottery Heritage Fund.

The much-enlarged scheme, to be administered over the next five years, will also make grants to parish churches towards building repairs of up to £25,000 that are linked to the conservation of an object, such as mending guttering or an area of roof if a leak is affecting wall paintings.

Bids for specialist surveys and help for existing recipients' conservation projects to reach completion will be considered for funding as well.

John Leaworthy

John sadly died on the 3rd February 2025 at the age of 84 after a number of years of ill health. John & Jane moved back to Essex from the Isle of Skye around 2004 and John became a valued member of the Ministry team, firstly during Martin Fletcher's incumbency, the subsequent interregnum and latterly, Anne-Marie's incumbency, taking many services at St. Luke's and regularly singing in the choir.

Before being ordained John had been a Lt. Commander in the Royal Navy. He was ordained at Exeter Cathedral. From the summary of his ministry below (from the Church Times) it can be seen he served all over the UK.

Maundy Thursday Agape Meal

On Maundy Thursday in St. Luke's extension we will be having our Agape meal followed by a communion service in the church. The meal itself starts at 6pm (setting up from 5.30pm) and comprises 3 courses of a simple bring and share buffet interspersed with some worship and singing. After the meal we move into the church itself for a communion service which concludes in silence as the church is stripped of everything to leave it bare and stark for Good Friday.

Stewardship

Firstly, a very big thank you to everyone who contributes towards the cost of running the church, either through regular giving or via the collection plate or in giving of your time and talents. We could not hope to be able to operate without your generosity.

Many of you are probably aware of Friend's of St Luke's (FoSL) which is the events committee set up to produce and manage events to raise money for the upkeep of the hall at St Luke's church.

For those who do not know us, we are a committee of currently 11 regular members who come up with ideas for enjoyable events for the community of Tiptree. In the past, we have raised sufficient funds to replace the windows in the Church hall and our latest project is to raise enough money for a porch for the hall and I am delighted to say that we are not far off our target.



St Luke's - PCC Teams

The main PCC has established a number of Teams who report to it to cover specific areas of life within the Church. Membership is not limited to PCC members. If you would like to join a Team please speak to Anne-Marie. The various Teams are:

In future Open Doors it is hoped that a brief summary of recent meetings can be included. To begin with as each Team meets it will write a short piece to cover what it does.

St Luke's Fabric Team

The Fabric Team consists of five members who meet regularly on a Monday morning between approx 9.00 am to 12.00. They are Ian Calvert, Mike Weston, Steven Johnson, Barry Wright and myself as Fabric Officer. Under the authority delegated by the PCC, the Fabric Team is responsible for maintaining, monitoring and controlling all aspects of the Church Building and the Extension and reports to the PCC through the Churchwardens.

The responsibilities of the Fabric Team will be to make recommendations for changes that are deemed necessary or desireable and they will review changes that may be made or suggested by other persons.

A number of main responsibilities are laid down in the Fabric Team Terms of Reference which include among others:-

- To ensure that the Church Building and the Extension are maintained to a high standard for use by the church, by churchgroups, by parishioners and for extended community use.
- To accomodate, and to work with our nominated Architect to ensure that the church is inspected, in line with Church of England Policy, every Quinquennium (five (5) years)
- To implement, as may be appropriate (and subject to available funding) and in consultation with the Team Rector and the Churchwardens, any improvements and maintenance items that may be identified during these quinquennial inspections.
- +To ensure that the PCC is fully informed of any issues involving the condition and safety of the Chuch and the Extension.

Meetings of the Team are held whenever they are required and suitable records are kept of all significant actions for recording in the PCC minutes.

Monday mornings are always busy as the list of tasks requiring attention, including maintaining the Churchyard during the Summer months is very time consuming. We would be pleased to hear from anybody who would like to join the team and assist us for a few hours each week with the variety of ongoing requirements. (Coffee and Biscuits are kindly provided by the Parent and Toddler helpers for our morning break!)

Finance & Stewardship Team

The Finance & Stewardship Team meets three times a year to review the current financial position and end of year accounts, consider requests for major expenditure and proposals for full PCC approval and recommendations for salary and other costs. Once every three years or so a stewardship campaign is organized to put to the wider church family.

At their last meeting in February the Treasurer went through the draft year end accounts. The specifications for the required electrical work were considered together with the requirements of a fire risk assessment. The sound system upgrade was also discussed.

St Luke's Worship & Discipleship Team

The team is elected by the PCC and at present consists of:

Revd Anne-Marie Renshaw, Pauline Swindle, Eric Wilson, Harold Toms, Sue Lyne, Jenny Cass.

We meet three times a year to review the worship at St Luke's and plan events such as Quiet Days, Training etc.

At our recent meeting the following was discussed:

- A training session will be held on Tuesday 17 June for Readers and Intercessors across the Benefice. This will be led by Anne-Marie using the Church and Extension.
- Music in church. The use of more modern songs and using the screen.
- New ideas for more creative worship on the 5th Sunday of the month.
- Possible evening service which would be more meditative and include music and silence.
- The need for another Housegroup if Leader and venue can be found.
- Encouraging increase in attendance at Messy Church.
- Healing Prayers on Sundays Clergy need to be reminded when this is happening so it can be announced.
- The importance of prayer for all aspects of our Church life.

The paintings of JMW Turner by Tim Lenton

It was 250 years ago, on 23rd April 1775, that ground-breaking British artist J M W Turner was born. The London-born watercolourist and printmaker transformed the established methods of painting, sweeping aside classical preoccupations of form and order.

Joseph Mallord William Turner, known in his time as William Turner, was a child prodigy born to a modest lower-middle-class family. He enrolled at the Royal Academy of Arts when he was 14 and exhibited his first work there a year later. He was a controversial figure, prone to depression and eccentric ideas, such as having himself tied to the mast of a ship during a storm so that he could experience what he wanted to paint.

Nevertheless Turner, who never married but had two daughters by the widow Sarah Danby, had many admirers and supporters from the outset. He travelled widely, particularly around Europe in 1802, and worked in the open air on detailed pencil sketches which he then turned into paintings.

One of his supporters was the MP and artist Walter Fawkes of Farnley Hall, near Otley in Yorkshire, and Turner returned to the area frequently to paint. He was also a friend of the Norwich School artist and clergyman Thomas Daniell.

Turner was certainly not a conventional Christian, but he had attended a Methodist Sunday school as a child and had a deep belief in God as Creator, which he reflected in his use of light in landscapes. Many of his paintings had Biblical themes.

Considered one of the most influential artists of all time, Turner is pictured on the £20 banknote, and this year sees a twelve-month festival of events and exhibitions across the UK to mark the 250 years since his birth.

Why a glass of milk may help save your life

Drinking a glass of milk a day could cut the risk of you getting bowel cancer by almost a fifth.

So say researchers at the University of Oxford. They have found strong evidence that calcium protects against the deadly disease.

According to the data, it takes only an extra 300mg of calcium a day (found in a large 240ml of milk, or a couple of pots of yoghurt) to result in a 17 per cent lessening of the risk of bowel cancer.

Currently, one in 20 women and one in 17 men in the UK will be diagnosed with bowel cancer during their lifetime. It affects around 44,000 people each year in the UK.

Waffle Berry Pudding

Jane Lawrence

Serves 10

- 2 packets (200 g each) sweet toasting waffles
- 150 g white chocolate
- 300 g frozen raspberries
- 55 g caster sugar
- 1 tablespoon plain flour
- 500 ml soured cream or crème fraîche
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon icing sugar



- 2. Place baking dish in microwave oven. Microwave, uncovered, on HIGH about 3 minutes or until raspberries are defrosted.
- 3. Combine caster sugar and flour in bowl; add soured cream, eggs and vanilla extract. Whisk until well blended. Spoon mixture evenly over top of raspberries.
- 4. Bake about 30-35 minutes or until golden brown and set in centre. Remove from oven; cool 10 minutes. Sprinkle with sifted icing sugar. Serve with vanilla ice cream, if desired.

Many millennials are still at home

Renting and buying your home is much more expensive than it was 20 years ago. So, no wonder that nearly half a million more young people are currently still living with their parents.

According to the Institute for Fiscal Studies (IFS), the 'Hotel of Mum and Dad' is flourishing, with nearly a fifth of all millennials still at home.

Bee Boileau of the IFS says: "In the last decade and a half, there has been a substantial increase in the proportion of young adults living with their parents. This has occurred alongside, and indeed has been fuelled by, increases in rents and house prices."

There are many advantages to living at home: young people can save more of their incomes, and living at home also provides a shelter for those recovering from bad relationships or redundancy.

Overall, in the 25 to 34 age brackets, men are more likely than women to be living at home (23 per cent compared with 15 per cent). Rates are higher among UK-born young people from Bangladeshi and Indian backgrounds (62 per cent and 50 per cent respectively).

Books of the Bible

Psalms

This month we continue our examination of a selection of books from the Old Testament.

'The Psalms have a unique place in the Bible, because most of the Scripture speaks to us, while the Psalms speak for us' (Athanasius of Alexandria).

The Book of Psalms contains 150 prayers or songs of praise, the majority (73) attributed to David, although some were composed later. They were mostly composed for liturgical worship. There are songs of praise, in which people joyfully express praise for God's work of creation and sustaining (eg 135 & 136). In others, the psalmist recounts a desperate situation and gives thanks for God's answer to his prayers (eg 30 & 116).

There are a significant number of psalms of lament, both individual (eg 3-7; 22) and communal (eg 44), which begin with a cry for help. Some express deliverance from sin (51 & 130), or point to the certainty that the Lord has heard their prayer (7, but contrast 88). The theme of trust is central in many psalms (23, 62 & 91).

The 'royal psalms' (eg 20, 21 & 72) point to the promised Messiah, fulfilled in Jesus. There are also psalms teaching wisdom (eg 37, 49); 'torah' psalms, focussing on the law of the Lord (eg 1, 19 & 119), and psalms which celebrate the history of Israel and God's faithfulness (eg 78, 105 & 106).

The psalms can help us in our own prayers, by providing us with models to follow, as they express our own deepest feelings as we approach God: 'The Lord is my shepherd, I shall lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he restores my soul' (Psalm 23:1-3).

Proverbs

The Book of Proverbs is an anthology of sayings ('mishle') that are generally attributed to Solomon (Proverbs 1:1), who uttered 3000 proverbs (1Kings 4:32). The purpose of these oracles is 'for attaining wisdom and discipline' (1:2). Solomon was concerned that people, especially the young, would understand 'the sayings and riddles of the wise.' (1:3-6). His guiding principle is that 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge.' (1:7).

To give an idea of the recurring themes in the book, here are a few examples:

Knowing God: 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding' (9:10).

Guarding Our Speech: 'A word aptly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver' (25:11).

Marital faithfulness: 'May your fountain be blessed and may you rejoice in the wife of your youth' (5:15-20).

Our Work: 'Go to the ant, you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise!' (6:6-11).

Dangers of Strong Drink: 'Wine is a mocker and beer a brawler; whoever is led astray by them is not wise' (20:1).

Justice and Honesty: 'The LORD abhors dishonest scales, but accurate weights are His delight' (11:1).

Underlying these sayings is a conviction about God's omniscience, 'For a man's ways are in full view of the LORD, and He examines all his paths' (5:21); providence, 'Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the LORD's purpose that prevails' (19:21) and goodness, 'The LORD is far from the wicked but He hears the prayer of the righteous' (15:29).

Proverbs reminds us that God is concerned with the way we live today. 'Wisdom is the art of living skilfully in whatever actual conditions we find ourselves' (Eugene Peterson).



It's that shoplifting has soared to an unprecedented amount. There were more than 20 million shoplifting incidents last year - an average of about 50,000 cases a day, according to the British Retail Consortium (BRC). In all, retailers lost £2.2 billion.

And it seems that shoplifters also like chocolate. Which is why some WH Smith shops have been tagging the Cadbury Mini Eggs, and why some Tesco stores have put Quality Street chocolates under a wire net, to name but a couple of examples.

Changing a light bulb is a generational thing

Do you know how to clean a car, change a lightbulb, hang a picture and identify a spanner? If yes, then chances are that you are a Baby Boomer (1955-1964) and not a Gen Z (1997-2012).

UPDATE: THE TOWER CLOCK, ALL SAINTS CHURCH MESSING

For some weeks now the Tower Clock has been out of commission in order to install an electrical winding mechanism. We are pleased to announce that this was successfully completed on 19th March, and it is now working again.

English Church Clocks are not simply oversized house clocks. They reach out over the entire community, having once been an essential public timekeeper, providing a time standard to which all watches and house clocks could be set and appointments met.

Messing Church clock was installed in 1809 by Thwaites & Reed, clockmakers since 1740. Throughout the years church clocks have always needed a dedicated person to climb the stairs of the tower to wind and regulate the clock. In our church, for over forty years, this has been done by Ivor Bennett. So twice a week, he ascends the tower and winds two massive weights up from the ground floor to a higher level. The one that powers the striker weighs 174 lbs and the one that powers the clock weighs 129lbs. That's the equivalent of lifting a 22 stone person the height of the tower twice a week so it requires a considerable manual effort to do!

Or at least it did. Now that the electric winder has been installed, electric motors will do all this automatically.

Ivor will still attend twice a week to regulate the clock.

All in all, they are a "national embarrassment", according to the chair of a House of Commons committee, the Public Accounts Committee (PAC).


